FAIRLAND (Special)—Some 375 guests attended the golden wedding celebration last Sunday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cooley.

The Rev. John Evans, who was reared in Fairland but now resides at Lawton, addressed the gathering of friends and relatives.

A golden bell, one of the Cooleys' gifts, pealed 50 times, representative of the number of years the honorees have been married.

The Cooleys spread a bountiful table across their front yard. The anniversary meal featured beef from a calf raised especially for the occasion. A three-tiered cake, topped with a loving cup, was encircled with white flowers and golden leaves.

Phoebe Crotzer and Charles Cooley are members of two of Ottawa county's pioneer families. Their mothers came to the Fairland area from Kansas in the early 1870s. Phoebe attended Fairland's high school.

The couple was married Nov. 10, 1906, at Atton and have lived on their 245-acre farm near here for 42 years. Their only child, a son, died in 1918.

A chat with your librarian, Mrs. Ernest Lawson: Have you considered coming to your library for books in the following categories: Answers to questions and problems pertaining to Christmas.

Successful party-givers have a secret. They make a habit of planning their parties carefully with the help of books from their public library.

If you want to be successful, the great scientist Louis Pasteur once said, "study a great man." Your library has many inspiring biographies of famous persons.

So you have to make a speech? Books on what to say and how to say it available at your library will make the job easier.

When you see a good movie on TV, would you like to read the story? Your library has many of the stories on which old and new movies are based.

Your newspaper brings you all the important news as it happens. To get more from the news, read the background events in books and magazines from your library.

New books at the library: "Psychology and Religion," by Carl Gustav Jung. In this slender volume we have Jung up-to-date. Many ideas about the basic foundations of religious needs and benefits, and incidentally, about mass drives and impulses of our contemporary life, are in these lectures.

"Common Sense and World Affairs," by Dorothy Fosdick. A discerning look at our relations with the rest of the world and at the principles we should apply to improve these relations. The author believes that if a significant number of Americans carried over in foreign affairs the good sense they show in handling their local and domestic concerns, the United States would be more likely to have a satisfactory foreign policy.

"Jericho's Daughters," by Paul I. Wellman. Three of Mr. Wellman's earlier novels have concerned the fortunes through the years of Jericho, Kansas. Now the saga of Jericho is closed with a contemporary story about the heirs of Jericho's virtues and evils.

"The Truth About Flying Saucers," by Aime Michel, the newest of the books on flying saucers at the Miami library is probably one of the least sensational books on this subject. The author concludes that there are such things as flying saucers and that they are extra-terrestrial in origin.
